### Pharoah – Jackie French



How far do you have to journey to become a king?



There are two ways of looking at Aissa's story. She's the miracle girl who escaped the raiders. Or she's the cursed child who called the Bull King's ship to the island.



### Pankration – Dyan Blacklock




Pirates, a wolf-fight, kidnap - a thrilling life-and-death story about the first Olympics.

### The Bronze Bow – Elizabeth George Spear



He trains my hands for war, so that my arms can bend a bow of bronze. –from the Song of David (2 Samuel 22:35) The Bronze Bow, written by Elizabeth George Speare (author of The Witch of Blackbird Pond) won the Newbery Medal in 1962. This gripping, actionpacked novel tells the story of eighteen-year-old Daniel bar Jamin—a fierce, hotheaded young man bent on revenging his father's death by forcing the Romans from his land of Israel. Daniel's palpable hatred for Romans wanes only when he starts to hear the gentle lessons of the traveling carpenter, Jesus of Nazareth. A fast-paced, suspenseful, vividly wrought tale of friendship, loyalty, the idea of home, community . . . and ultimately, as Jesus says to Daniel on page 224: "Can't you see, Daniel, it is hate that is the enemy? Not men. Hate does not die with killing. It only springs up a hundredfold. The only thing stronger than hate is love." A powerful, relevant read in turbulent times.

### Just a Girl – Jackie French



Mary, the mother of Jesus, was a truly extraordinary woman. And after 2000 years, the story of her brave and remarkable life continues to inspire and enthrall us, as that young woman from Nazareth was never 'just a girl'.

Who was Mary of Nazareth, the most famous woman in all of history? In 72 AD, as the Roman army pillages Judea and destroys their village, killing and enslaving its inhabitants, fourteen-year-old Judith hides with her younger sister, her great-grandmother Rabba and an unwilling goat in a storage cave used for storage. Judith is 'just a girl', but her skills will save them - and help escaped Roman slave Caius survive as well.

Wolves - and humans - threaten them all during that long, icy winter, but there are feasts of stored, and scavenged food to enjoy as they listen to Rabba tell stories of her youth; of her wealthy marriage in Jerusalem and her life in Nazareth as a child. But there is one story Rabba will not tell, no matter how


much they coax her. It is the story of Maryiam, her beloved friend who faced the scandal and shame of an unwed pregnancy and the anguish of seeing her son crucified.

Yet the example of the woman Maryiam, who showed how pain and humiliation can become the most joyous story in the world, will give Judith and her younger sister and Caius the courage to step beyond their refuge. Because like Judith, 'Maryiam of Nazareth' was never 'just a girl'.

Based on primary sources, this book tells the story of the Mary behind the legend, of her life and her extraordinary legacy, still an inspiration after 2000 years.

### Counting by 7s – Holly Goldberg Sloan




In the tradition of *Out of My*Mind, Wonder, and Mockingbird, this is an intensely moving middle grade novel about being an outsider, coping with loss, and discovering the true meaning of family.

Willow Chance is a twelve-year-old genius, obsessed with nature and diagnosing medical conditions, who finds it comforting to count by 7s. It has never been easy for her to connect with anyone other than her

adoptive parents, but that hasn&;t kept her from leading a quietly happy life . . . until now.

Suddenly Willow&;s world is tragically changed when her parents both die in a car crash, leaving her alone in a baffling world. The triumph of this book is that it is *not* a tragedy. This extraordinarily odd, but extraordinarily endearing, girl manages to push through her grief. Her journey to find a fascinatingly diverse and fully believable surrogate family is a joy and a revelation to read.

### Everything I've Never Said – Samantha Wheeler




Ava would like nothing more than to tell her family she loves them, particularly her big sister, Nic. But Ava has Rett syndrome - she can't talk, can't nod her head, can't even point at a communication card. She understands everything, but no one understands her.


A powerful novel about a subject rarely tackled - young people with disabilities and the families who love and support them.

### Fish in a Tree-Lynda Mullaly Hunt





As her confidence grows, Ally feels free to be herself and the world starts opening up with possibilities. ### Out of my Mind – Sharon Draper



Melody is not like most people. She cannot walk or talk, but she has a photographic memory; she can remember every detail of everything she has ever experienced. She is smarter than most of the adults who try to diagnose her and smarter than her classmates in her integrated classroom the very same classmates who dismiss her as mentally challenged, because she cannot tell them otherwise. But Melody refuses to be defined by cerebral palsy. And she's determined to let everyone know it... somehow.

### Turtle Boy – M. Evan Wolkenstein



The heartwarming and heartbreaking story of a boy who's afraid to live, learning to embrace the life he has from a boy who soon may die.


12-year-old Will likes two things: turtles and the local nature preserve. Everything else is a nightmare, because Will has a facial difference that has earned him an unfortunate nickname. But when Will meets RJ, who is confined to a hospital room, each boy discovers they have strength to lend the other and that life is too short to live in a shell.

What Stars are Made of – Sarah Allen



Libby was born with a heart three sizes too big. She takes daily shots, can't do monkey bars, and doesn't always read social cues. But having Turner Syndrome doesn't mean she can't be a scientist when she grows up. Besides her big sister Nonny, Libby's hero is astronomer Cecilia Payne, who discovered what stars are made of. When Nonny comes home to stay and tells Libby that she and her husband Thomas are having a baby, Libby knows what to do: She'll make Cecilia Payne the subject of her entry into a contest, and give all the first-place prize money—twentyfive thousand dollars!—to Nonny's growing family. But it'll take more tenacity than she's ever needed to help take care of the sister who has always taken care of her, all while navigating middle school with a unique set of challenges.

### Sofa Surfer – Malcolm Duffy




Written with humour and heart, *Sofa Surfer* looks at what it means to be homeless. Malcolm Duffy's debut novel *Me Mam. Me Dad. Me.*, about domestic violence, was shortlisted for the Waterstones Children's Prize 2019, longlisted for the Branford Boase Award 2019 and selected for World Book Night.

15-year-old Tyler's teenage angst turns to outright rebellion when his family leave London for a new life in Yorkshire. He's angry with his parents about the upheaval and furious at losing his home. With only the dog to confide in, Tyler has no idea that a chance meeting with a skinny girl called Spider will lead him into a world he never even knew existed. Spider is living on the streets and Tyler finds himself spinning a tangled web of lies in his efforts to help her escape from this dark and dangerous place.

Sofa Surfer shows how empathy and action can help those sleeping rough. As with his widely praised debut Me Mam. Me Dad. Me., Malcolm Duffy finds humour and heart even in dire situations. Relevant, warm and rewarding Sofa Surfer is about what happens when going home isn't an option.

### Cardboard Cowboys – Brian Conaghan





An exceptionally moving story of triumph against all odds set during World War 2, from the acclaimed author of Jefferson's Sons and for fans of Number the Stars.



### A Great Escape – Felice Arena



### We Are Wolves – Katring Nannestad




Sometimes it's good to be wild.

### The Year the Maps Changed – Danielle Binks




One extraordinary year will change them all...

Sima and her family are pressed to the rough, cold ground among fifty others. They lie next to the tall fence designed to keep them in. The wires are cut one by one.


When they make their escape, a guard raises the alarm. Shouting, smoke bombs, people tackled to the ground. In the chaos Sima loses her parents.



by her own family's escape from Budapest during the Holocaust.


### Beyond Belief - Dee White

Interned – Pamela Rushby




Based on true events, *Interned* is a moving, well-researched and evocative historical fiction novel that highlights an often forgotten moment in Australian history.

### The Book of Secrets - A. L. Tait



### The Storm Keeper's Island – Catherine Doyle




When Fionn Boyle sets foot on Arranmore Island, it begins to stir beneath his feet ...

### The Owl Service - Alan Garner



### Scythe - Neal Shusterman




In a perfect world, what is there left to fear? A chilling and thought-provoking sci-fi novel from New York Times bestselling author Neal Shusterman.


### Oddity - Eli Brown

The Bourne Identity meets The Terminator in this fast-paced technothriller for readers aged 10 to 14.


It was only a matter of time until one escaped.

mysteries of our world, *Monstrous Devices* plunges readers into a gripping adventure that's sure to surprise.


### Goblin Mafia Wars – D. C. Green

### The Fighting Stingrays- Simon Mitchel




## Winner of the Young People's History Prize at the NSW Premier's History Awards

### Playing Beatie Bow - Ruth Park




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### Tom Appleby, Convict Boy – Jackie French

### Catch a Falling Star – Meg McKinlay





### Grace Beside Me - Sue McPherson




Written from teenager girl Fuzzy Mac's perspective, Grace Beside Me is a quirky, warmly rendered story of home and family life in a small town.


everything from how to to 'sit a while' in the bush and connect with country to how to properly hang out the washing.

### 47 Degrees – Justin d'Ath




Zeelie wonders if they're in danger.


Adrift on the Antarctic pack ice with no means of escape and no hope of rescue, Ernest Shackleton and his men are surely doomed.



### Unmasked – Turia Pitt



### A Traveller in Time – Alison Uttley




### The Seeing Stone: Arthur – Kevin Crossley-Holland
